A private motor tour will begin at the Embassy Suites and travels into Historic Charleston to take you around the peninsula and share the history and stories that makes Charleston the jewel of the southeastern United States and "America's Best-kept Secret." Through occupation, economic hardship, fires, earthquakes, and hurricanes, Charleston has exhibited a remarkable resilience. History is found literally around every corner, and the city is often called a living museum.

Following the motor tour, you will get the chance to experience Charleston a little closer from horse-drawn carriages. During the ride, you will experience a tour of 25 – 30 blocks of Charleston's historic downtown district. You will see houses, gardens, mansions, churches, and parks as you hear about the different buildings, history, architecture, flora and people. Most importantly you will become one with all that Charleston has to offer the visitor.

After the carriage tour, your motor transportation will take you across Charleston's Arthur Ravenel Bridge into Mount Pleasant, where you will have the opportunity to experience a plantation first-hand.

Boone Hall Plantation has been open to the public since 1959 and is one of America's oldest working, living plantations. The McRae Family purchased the plantation in 1955 and it was Mrs. McRae who furnished the house with antiques and began giving tours. Today, the McRae Family still owns the property, and they continue to make improvements to the plantation so that you, the visitor, can experience what plantation life was like in the 1800s. As you tour each site on the plantation our knowledgeable staff will help you understand the day to day activities of those who lived on plantations as well the history of the people who lived here at Boone Hall.

Boone Hall Plantation also presents live presentations that cannot be found on any other plantations in the area and are part of what helps make Boone Hall unique. Shows such as "Exploring the Gullah Culture", give visitors the opportunity to experience through song, dance, and language...life lessons of the Gullah Culture adapted by African slaves. The show's host Ms. Sharon Cooper gives an outstanding performance that has proven to be one of the most popular shows in the Low Country area.

While at Boone Hall, guests will also have the opportunity to enjoy boxed lunches underneath the picnic shelter on the back lawn of the plantation grounds
